Building a Plan for the Future

Dear Members:

The 2017 Chesaning Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors is in the process of making a huge decision to help maintain the viability of the Chamber in the future. Our beautiful building that was built with Chamber & Showboat funds has become very expensive for the Chamber to maintain on its own. It is also going to need some extensive repairs over the next few years.

The Chamber's reason for existence is to promote our members and to help grow our business community. The normal day to day expenses along with the need for \$25,000 to \$40,000 in repairs have put the Board in a precarious position.

In the last several months we were approached by representatives of the Village about the possibility of sharing our building and property with the Village of Chesaning. Their office buildings are in need of a tremendous amount of repair as well. The Board has been floating ideas back and forth with the Village about possible ways for this "sharing" to happen. The Village has now proposed to do a large addition to "our" building at no cost to us. However, in order to make the financing possible, The Chamber would need to deed the building and property over to the Village in exchange for a 100-year lease (that automatically renews every 99 years) for \$1.00 per year. The Village would be responsible for all maintenance inside and outside of the building. The Chamber would

pay a small percentage of the utilities based on the size of our office in relation the total square footage of the building. Partnering with the Village would give the Chamber the opportunity to dedicate more of its budget to marketing its membership and the community of Chesaning.

After having discussed this at many meetings, 2017 Board of Directors feels it is in the best long term interest of the Chamber to accept this proposal from the Village. Financing for this project must still be secured by the Village before it can move forward. This was not an easy decision and it was definitely not taken lightly as we understand the pride of ownership of this beautiful building and property by our membership. We welcome your questions and input on this decision. Our next Board of Directors meeting is Thursday, May 11th at 8:00_{AM}.

AFS Mid-Michigan - 15 Years Old!

AFS Intercultural Programs began in 1915 as the American Ambulance Field Service (later to be known as the "American Field Service" or AFS), a voluntary ambulance and truck organization which emerged soon after the outbreak of World War I and was reactivated in WWII. After the wars, AFS created a high school exchange program hoping to maintain and strengthen the international friendships they had fostered during their wartime humanitarian work.

Today, AFS is a global community including 59 country partners and affiliates, over 12,000 participants, 43,000+ volunteers, 1000+ staff and alumni (returnees) numbering 450,000 and counting! At the local level, AFS Mid-Michigan is a chapter of the AFS Michigan Team serving the area encompass-

ing roughly Genesee, Saginaw, and Shiawassee counties and the Lansing area. AFS Mid-Michigan began in 2002 when local volunteers felt the need to organize regionally to better support their participants. This year, the chapter is supporting 18 students hosted within our region and a New Lothrop student who is studying abroad in Thailand.

Jessica Andres, Pam Shelito and Kate Weber are the local volunteer coordinators for the chapter and are currently seeking host families for the 2017-18 school year as well as students interested in studying abroad and additional volunteers. Happy 25th to Michigan Festivals & Events Association!

In 1990, Sue Bila, President/CEO of MFEA, was working with a privately-owned festival in Frankenmuth and serving on the Board of Directors for the Michigan Fairs Association. Through her work with these groups, she saw the opportunity for providing education and marketing to the many Michigan festivals and their volunteers. She shared her idea with a newly formed advisory board who formed the vision of what MFEA was to become and, in 1992, took that vision to a new level with 40 charter members.

Great accomplishments often come from humble beginnings. MFEA started in a home office during the era of no cell phones, no websites, and no social media. Sue and her staff relied on the telephone and postal system, as well as the work of many members and friends who have helped carry the organization to the level it has attained today. Long time sponsors, including Pepsi (the official soft drink of MFEA) have become true partners in their success. Local support from Chamber member businesses has been greatly appreciated as well; for example, CenturyLink has graciously provided a home to the MFEA offices for over 20 years.

Through careful stewardship, MFEA has been able to exceed the responsibilities of grant funds received and is now recognized as the largest State Festivals, Fairs, Events, & Destinations Association in the Nation!

Today, the Michigan Festivals and Events Association is a statewide non-profit organization boasting over 850 members. Their busy office staff (2 full and 3 part time employees) work diligently to market and provide education to their members including festivals, events, tourism and governmentrelated agencies, main attractions, yearround and seasonal fun spots, lodging, students, and vendors catering to festivals and events. This year, they are reaching new heights with a new annual magazine highlighting member events and their muchanticipated move to the historic Carriage House located behind Chesaning's Heritage House (summer of 2017).

Chesaning is fortunate to have such a wonderful Michigan asset make its home in the heart of our community! Congratulations to Sue and her staff, the MFEA Board of Directors and members. The Chesaning Chamber wishes you continued success!



Chesaning's Oldest Living Resident- Anna Danek Gall

The life of a little girl in the early 1900's was different from today, but the same in many ways. Anna Danek Gall was born on May 4, 1915 on a farm on state road south of Chesaning. She is 102 today and just as bright as can be. Her hearing may give her a few problems, but she is just as beautiful and interesting as ever. I had the privilege to talk to her and hear a little bit about history as a young girl in the early 1900's. She couldn't understand why anyone would be interested in her life. I said who better to learn about history then from someone who has lived 102 years. She replied "oh, no one cares about that stuff". Little does she know how amazing she really is.

As a little girl, she lived on a farm that had a wood range for heat and cooking. They used lamps for light before they had electricity, and used an outhouse for a bathroom. For fun as a child they played ball and hung out at Easton Hall. Her family of 5 brothers and 2 sisters played together, and visited relatives with their parents. Her brother Tony Danek went off to the war.

Anna walked to a one room school house which she attended until the 8th grade. They heated the school with coal and wood, and had a pail of water for drinking with one dip-

per for everyone to use. There were 2 outhouses, one for the boys and one for the girls.

Anna married the love of her life, John Gall, at the age of 22, he was 24. They had a ceremony at the Methodist church in Chesaning and moved across the road from her childhood homestead. John worked at Hehr, was a farmer and a bus driver. Anna was a homemaker and cleaned the bank, which is now PNC. They would hang out at the elevator in town and liked to play cards and polka dance. They also never missed a Showboat. It was a simple life filled with many memories and the love of a close family.

One of her most interesting memories was the Detroit Tigers coming to Easton Hall and playing ball for a benefit (around the 1950's, she couldn't remember the exact year). She said there was a very large crowd that attended. The Detroit tiger story was probably the most surprising to me. If only I could crawl inside her brain for a day to experience a small piece of the life she lived. It sounds like she grew up down the road from Little House on the Prairie, but lived through the experience of all the technology of the 20th century. I can only pray that I live to be 102 and have lived life like Anna has.
